FROM COMMUNITY INTO CARING: RE-1 IN-SERVICE PROGRAM

Community of Caring's Mary Bielz and Build a Generation's Lisa Noble used a mining theme to present their program proposal for collaboration between community members, businesses and the school district, at the start of the new school year in Cripple Creek. Emphasizing the three "veins" of Community of Caring — Values, Collaboration and Service — with RE-1 as the head frame, they began by asking, "What is the community doing to build relationships with all our kids?"

For the next three hours, attendees were led through a history of Community of Caring, its purpose and the model, and were finally challenged with this year's theme: "Claiming Community into Caring!" The group, including two dozen community agencies, were asked to come up with new ideas for connecting RE-1 with community to build opportunities for the youth of the district.

Numerous possibilities for collaboration, from new workforce center programs to helping with district museum projects, energized the group. Four \$500 awards will be given in May to community agencies or school groups for projects demonstrating excellence in positive impact.

Criteria for goals/objectives and outcomes for "Claiming Community into Caring" are available at the Aspen Mine Center. If you have an idea for collaboration with our

youth, take up the challenge of "Claiming Community into Caring!"

Addressing the Need for Early Childhood Care

Community of Caring hosted a pre-provider informational meeting Sept. 13 at the Aspen Mine Center. Eleven people interested in the area's need for early childhood care attended. The orientation meeting was facilitated by Leanne Cabral and Child Care Connections of Colorado Springs. Snacks and child care were provided.

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the re-

quirements of C-CAP under Teller County Social Services, for licensed and unlicensed in-home child care providers, as well as opportunities for training and mentoring to achieve qualification to state standards. Local discussion about meeting the critical early childhood needs in southern Teller County are ongoing. Stay tuned for more!

RURAL PHILANTHROPY DAYS SUCCESS!

For the first time ever, Cripple Creek hosted the Heart of Colorado Rural Philanthropy Days in late September. For a year, a steering committee of several dozen people met monthly and worked on subcommittees in between. Cripple Creek's Lisa Noble and Jill Sievers were two of the event's three co-chairs. Community of Caring's Suzanne Core was an active member of the steering committee and helped organize the dine-around portion. Heart of Colorado has a healthy nonprofit population, as evidenced by the fact that the 250-person limit was reached earlier than anticipated and registration ultimately had to be extended by another 25 to 30 participants.

RPD is an opportunity for two of eight Colorado regions to host the state's grant-makers once every four years. It includes conference sessions, social time (in this case a reception, Wednesday night dine-arounds, Thursday night banquet, breakfasts and lunch times), and a Friday morning "speed dating" event where grantseekers and grantmakers sat across from each other at round tables to discuss possibilities for funding various projects and programs.

Mary Bielz, Ted Borden and Suzanne Core attended the event for Community of Caring and the Aspen Mine Center. They all received positive feedback from a number of grantmakers contacted during the event. In particular, grantmakers gave green lights to seeking additional funds for transportation and food assistance.

CRIPPLE CREEK-VICTOR MOUNTAIN HEALTH CENTER ALMOST HERE! by Lauren Murray

Cripple Creek-Victor Mountain Health Center (CCV MHC) School-Based Health Center is awaiting final licensing to open its doors at Cresson Elementary in the nurse's office. We anticipate opening in late fall or early winter. There will be a kickoff for registration during the week of Nov. 16-20. Nov. 20-21 will be parent/teacher conferences and registration will be available during those times. CCV MHC looks forward to serving CCV students and their siblings ages 0-21 years. CCV MHC will provide physical health, dental health and behavioral health needs in the school setting. CCV MHC has partnered with Peak Vista Community Health Center, Pikes Peak Mental Health and Cripple Creek Coun-

seling Center to provide health care services. A mid-level provider will be on-site at school two days a week to serve the needs of our students. Some of the services offered will be: athletic and well child physicals, immunizations, sick child care, some prescription funding, dental screenings, sealants and restorative care, and group counseling in elementary, junior and senior high schools. CCV MHC is funded through the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment. It will be continually funded through grants. A \$5.00 donation will be requested at each visit but will not be required for a student to see a provider.
